Only count 2nd & 3rd story windows that require a ladder or standing on a roof.

If there is a balcony, count them as 1st story.



Double-Hung Window

These windows open by sliding a sash up and/or down. Sometimes they are hung right next to each other; count each one that opens individually.

French Double-Hung Window (True Divided)

These windows open by sliding a sash up and/or down. Sometimes they are hung right next to each other; count each one that opens individually. These have grids that separate the glass into smaller panes. If there are more than 12 small panes, please see French Doors/Windows below.

Slider Windows

These windows open by sliding a sash sideways.

Double Slider Windows

These windows open by sliding a sash sideways on each side, but the middle window is a fixed pane window that does not open.

Casement Windows

These windows open by turning a crank. Count each pane that cranks open. If they are a double casement (right) you would count them as 2. Please note, if you have removable double pane inserts, you must count each one as a pane as well if you want them cleaned. So if they are removable double-paned you would count the window to the left as 2 and the one to the right as 4.

Picture Windows

These windows do not open and do not have screens. They are generally larger pieces of glass that sometimes have a frame and/or are sometimes siliconed to another large piece of glass to form a wall or a corner window. They can sometimes be arched. Count each pane of glass as 1 picture

Sliding Glass Doors



These doors are generally large pieces of glass with frames that slide open. They come typically come in panels with 2-4 doors, but sometimes can be more. Count each piece of glass that you want cleaned. For example, the doors in the picture would count as 2.

French Doors & Windows



These doors and windows are divided up into many smaller panes. Often times the windows may be hung right next to each other or 2 doors may be placed together. Count each window or door that you want cleaned as 1. For example, the doors in the picture (right) would count as 2.

Transoms, Glass Doors, Glass Blocks, and Geometric
Transoms are generally small windows above a door, window, or set of windows (Left, top). These get counted separate from the windows/doors that they are over.

Glass doors (Right) are panes that are set in the frame of a door, but are not divided into small panes like French doors. Count each pane you want cleaned. The top illustration would count as 2 and the lower would count as 1.



Glass blocks are usually found in bathrooms and are small cubes. (Left, center)

Geometric shapes are usually fixed windows that do not open and can be circles, squares, octagons, rectangles or triangles. (Left, bottom)
